


Governor Pat's District Notes

2016 Council on Legislation

Have you ever believed we need to change how we do things in Rotary? Is there a modification of Rotary's policies, procedures, or bylaws that you and your Club feel would make Rotary more effective and relevant? Now is the time to propose a change; your next opportunity is not until **2017**!

Every 3 years, Rotarians representing each of Rotary's 535 Districts meet to consider legislation that governs how Rotary operates worldwide. This meeting is known as the "Council on Legislation". The next Council will take place in April, 2016, and I am honored to serve as your COL Representative.


Even though 2016 seems a long way off, there is less than 6 months left to submit proposed legislation for the 2016 Council. RI must **receive** proposed legislation, along with its certification form signed by the District Governor and proposer's purpose and effect statement, no later than **31 December 2014**.

Because proposed legislation needs an endorsement of the District *prior to* submission to Rotary International, we request Clubs send the District Governor their proposed legislation by **30 November 2014.**

Is your club holding an event?



Many clubs are holding special events and fund raisers. Some are aware they need to give a Certificate of Insurance to the property owner and have been using the Rotary International provided insurance to do this. Some clubs are not aware. If you are one of those clubs who have not been obtaining a Certificate of insurance it is easy to do on your own. RI has provided a "portal" for you to create your certificate.
